PREREQUISITE(S):

I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course provides the new student with an overview of natural resources and opportunities provided by them in Canada and more specifically Ontario.

Through guest speakers, students will learn about the importance and opportunities provided in fields such as forestry, fish & wildlife, parks and outdoor recreation, adventure/ecotourism and the management of native lands. Speakers from key agencies responsible for the stewardship and management of natural resources such as the Ministry of Natural Resources, Parks/Heritage Canada, forestry companies and others will elaborate on the role of the technician/technologist in their field. To help the student adjust to the college learning environment, the course will provide a short study skills/time management orientation tutorial.

II. STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:
