COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course leads students through an in-depth review of provincial acts and regulations pertaining to natural resources and parks. Students will learn how to locate, interpret and analyze various provincial acts, regulations, and cases.

## II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

Interpret provincial legislation pertaining to fish and wildlife management, specifically the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, the Endangered Species Act, the Fish Inspection Act and the Heritage Hunting and Fishing Act.

## Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Identify the right to hunt and fish in Ontario
- Interpretation and application of the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act and the regulations
- Interpretation and application of the Endangered Species Act and the regulations
- Interpretation and application of the Fish Inspection Act

This learning outcome will constitute approximately 40 % of the course's grade
