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# I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The aim of this course is to introduce students to the use of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) as a source of immediate information and as an analytic tool for solving natural resource management problems. Students will be using ESRI's ArcGIS software.

### II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

# Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Be able to identify the usefulness of GIS applications in natural resource management.

#### Potential Elements of the Performance:

- define what a GIS is and does
- identify GIS software used by various agencies and the strength and weaknesses of each
- investigate solutions to real world natural resource management problems using GIS
- 2. Be able to use the ArcMap and ArcCatalog interface effectively

# Potential Elements of the Performance:

- access and start the ArcMap software
- open and close projects and exit from the software correctly
- read the project window and understand it's graphical user interface
- use ArcCatalog to browse and access files in various directories
- re-boot the computer if the system locks up
- use Windows XP
- 3. Open a Map Document and use the user interface to create data frames and manipulate layers..

#### Potential Elements of the Performance:

- view and manipulate project properties
- manipulate view properties and operations
- manipulate layer (theme) properties and operations
- add layers to a view
- add labels to a layer
- make a data frame active

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4. Be able to manipulate basic TABLE properties and operations.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- build a new table
- edit a table by adding and deleting fields
- perform a query using the Field Calculator function
- retrieve statistics and advanced calculations relating to a table
- make and save a summary table
- 5. Be able to create a CHART from a table.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- manipulate chart properties and operations including type of chart, the chart axes, labels, scale and colors
- 6. Manipulate and customize the symbology for feature classes within a layer (theme).

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- change symbols for features in a layer
- save and load a legend
- access and retrieve different symbol palettes and add labels to symbols
- 7. Create and print a LAYOUT

# Potential Elements of the Performance:

- manipulate layout properties and operations
- add components to the layout including the data frame, the legend, the scale bar, the north arrow, the chart, the table, and picture
- 8. Use ArcToolbox to perform geoprocessing tasks.

# Potential Elements of the Performance:

- be able to analyze spatial data by buffering features, overlaying data and calculating attribute values
- be able to properly use the merge, dissolve, clip, union, erase, intersect and calculate areas tools to manipulate layers

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9. Integrating GPS with GIS

### Potential Elements of the Performance:

- be able to upload and download waypoints and tracks between a GPS and GIS using DNR Garmin
- be able to manually enter GPS coordinates into ArcGIS
- be able to edit waypoints and tracks using the editor function
- be able to georeference an aerial photograph and/or satellite image

- 3. Exploring ArcCatalog
- 4. Symbolizing features and rasters
- 5. Classifying features and rasters, labeling features
- 6. Querying data, joining and relating tables

- 8. Analyzing spatial data, projecting data in ArcMap
- 9. Editing features and attributes
- 10. Geoprocessing using ArcToolbox
- 11. Making maps for presentation
- 12. Integrating GPS with GIS
