This course will acquaint natural resource students with knowledge of the relevant Acts at the Federal and Provincial levels that pertain to natural resources. They will learn to navigate legislation and identify various legal issues within the respective disciplines. A section is devoted to the Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the fundaments of the Canadian legal system.
