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#### I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to provide the student with the necessary knowledge and an understanding that controlling infection and disease is an important part of the salon industry. You are responsible for performing services in a manner that will protect clients and yourself from disease. This unit will help you understand the cause of disease and to help you develop recommended sanitation procedures.

#### II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Understand that the theory of bacteriology is important to you as a hairstylist so that you can protect your own health and that of your client. You will be exposed to a variety of germs and microbes, so it is critical to learn methods of infection control.

### Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Describe bacteriology concepts
- Define bacteria
- · List the various areas where bacteria can exist
- 2. Know that bacteria have distinct shapes that identify them, and you should know the different classes and what type of disease or infection they cause.

### Potential Elements of the Performance:

- List and describe the classifications of bacteria
- Describe how bacteria grow and reproduce
- Describe the relationship of bacteria to the spread of disease
- Define aids and provide a brief overview of aids
- 3. Understand that sanitation consists of measures used to promote public health and prevent the spread of infectious disease. As a hairstylist, you come into direct contact with a client's skin, scalp and hair. Understanding sanitary measures insures the protection of you and your client's health.
