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I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to provide the student with the necessary knowledge and skills to ensure the safety of themselves and the client, through the practice of continuous safe housekeeping following related legislation and safety standards. CSA approved equipment and tools will be introduced and used. Students will understand human anatomy and physiology as they relate to the service provided. Introduction to, and interpretation of the material safety data sheets will provide an explanation of the chemical components, storage of, and health risks of products. Students will acquire knowledge pertaining to the safe handling of all health and safety situations that may arise in the salon.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will:

1. Apply the necessary practices to provide a safe work environment.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Demonstrate procedures for salon cleanliness
- Carry out the procedures for sanitation of tools, equipment and surfaces within the salon
- Identify personal hygiene procedures
- Demonstrate personal hygiene procedures
- Handle and store hazardous materials
- Interpret MSDS
- Identify the functions of the human body through anatomy and physiology, as they apply to the service
- Practice safety procedures
- Identify emergency situations and necessary numbers and equipment

2. Identify the form of energy used to heat, light, and operate a salon for a safe work environment.
