DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to acquaint the student with some of the major problems faced by our North American society today. Topics to be discussed will include inter alia, Inequality, Prejudice, Changing Sex Roles, Substance Abuse, Deviance and Mental Disorders.

Simply put, the main objective of the course is to present an academically-sound introduction to the sociology of social problems. Obviously, sociological terms must be used in discussing the subject, but these will be kept to a minimum. Except for the necessary use of such terminology, there would seem to be no intrinsic merit in an obtuse term when a plain word is available. In fact, the excitement of Sociology is best communicated in easily comprehended English which conveys a message on any subject more effectively than does ornate and turgid phraseology. In sum, it is my aim to present a humanized version of sociology.

Judicious use will be made of Audio/Visual material and guest speakers.

If time permits, additional areas will be examined.
