Course Description:	This course is designed to introduce students to the profession of Social Work and to provide a learning environment that enhances students` academic, field, and professional success. The fundamental goal of the course is to prepare students for Social Service Work practice by introducing the expectations, role and scope of practice of Social Service Work, the guiding ethics and values of the profession, and the practice frameworks (theories and models) used to provide supports and to create change. Students will be introduced to select theoretical knowledge and practice models required within the profession. Professional skills required for SSW practice, such as reflective practice, critical thinking, organizational skills, time management and personal accountability will be incorporated into the course.
