Course Description:	This course offers theoretical, research-based and applied information regarding diverse populations in Ontario. Students will gain basic understanding of the needs, barriers and strengths of the populations studied. Students will learn entry level engagement skills and how to adapt assessment, intervention and referral strategies to address client needs. Emphasis will be on older adults, persons with disabilities, and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgendered, Transsexual, Two-Spirit, Intersex and Questioning (LGBTTTIQ) individuals. This course provides a basis for further skill and knowledge development in the SSW 400: SSW Advocacy in a Multicultural Society course. Anti-oppressive and strengths-based theory will be applied to understanding the barriers experienced by identified populations and factors related to resiliency will be discussed and applied.
