Sorae theoretical concepts and topics in algebra, geometry and trigonometry will be covered. These concepts and topics will be reinforced by the sue of practical problems to make the current topic relevant to the students' needs,

#### II. STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:

The basic objectives are that the student develop an understanding of the methods studied, demonstrate a knowledge of the facts presented and show an ability to use these in the solution of problems. To accomplish these objectives, exercises are assigned. Test questions will be of near equal difficulty to questions assigned in the exercises.
