

COURSE NAME: TOTAL CREDIT HOURS:

DESIGN I 48 hours over 16 weeks

DESCRIPTION: This course acquaints participants with the various possibilities of working with two-dimensional design. Using graphite, marker, collage, and basic printmaking/stamping techniques, participants will explore line, form, shape, space, texture, colour, and the use of negative and positive space. In addition to in-class assignments, participants will be required to complete and present a major piece in two-dimensions at the end of term.

PHILOSOPHY/GOALS: At the completion of this course students will have a working knowledge of the principals of two-dimensional design; students will have had the opportunity for hands-on application of same.

This course is an introduction to the basic principals of two-dimensional design and is designed to enhance the student's Core Curriculum. It should be considered a basic level course, to be taken as a follow-up or pre-cursor to Design II.

CONTENT:

 students will be required to complete a total of eight projects exploring the basic principles of two-dimensional design--seven projects are to be completed in class over a total of fourteen weeks; the eighth project is to be completed outside of class and presented during the last class of the term;

 students will be required to keep a design journal to be shown upon the completion of each project;

3) projects will be designed to illustrate basic two-dimensional design principals.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS: There will be 16 three hour class sessions in total. Fourteen sessions will focus upon the explanation of basic principles in 2-D design followed by in-class studio time to apply same. The first class session will serve as an introduction to the basic elements of design; the final class session will be set aside for student presentations of the assigned term project.
