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I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course acquaints participants with the various possibilities of working with two-dimensional design. Using graphite, marker, collage and basic printmaking/stamping techniques, participants will explore line, form, shape, space, texture, colour and the use of negative and positive space. In addition to in-class assignments, participants will be required to research, complete and present a major piece in two-dimensions at the end of the term.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Identify the basic elements of design

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Recognize forms and shapes in simple and complex designs
- Plan simple 2-dimensional designs using planes, line and/or points
- Work with graphite, markers and pencils to create rough sketches
- 2. Explore and recognize the possibilities and limitations of design elements.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Plan complex 2-D designs using planes, lines and/or points
- Apply basic design principles, i.e. detached, touching, overlapping, union, penetration, intersection, subtraction, coinciding
- Create 2-D designs working with acrylic paints, printmaking/stamping technique and collage
- 3. Apply design elements to create effective 2-D compositions

Potential Elements of Performance:

- Create complex designs in accordance with the principles of formal composition, i.e. translation, rotation, reflection and dilation
- Create complex designs in accordance with the principles of informal composition, i.e. gravity, contrast, rhythm and centre of interest
- Manipulate design elements and media to create texture, tension, balance and the illusion of 3-dimensional space and volume

4. Demonstrate a high level of technique, style and quality in art production and presentation

Potential Elements of Performance:

- Develop design concepts in a design journal and through multiple rough sketches
- Refine design ideas to create effectively planned and complex 2-D work and/or collage techniques
- Present final projects in a clean, professional manner, mounted on illustration board with cover sheet

III. TOPICS:

Note: These topics sometimes overlap several areas of skill development and are not necessarily intended to be explored in isolated learning units or in the order below.

- 1. Elements and principles of two-dimensional design.
- 2. Exploration of form and shape.
- 3. Formal compositions.
- 4. Informal compositions.
- 5. Space and volume.
- 6. Texture and colour.
- 7. Student presentations of term project.
