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Course Title: DRAWING II

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This intermediate level course is designed to build upon skills introduced in Drawing I. Participants will work from live models, and from the environment, while exploring contour, gesture, and various modelled drawing techniques. Participants will be encouraged to use a variety of media from graphite, conte, and charcoal to ink and/or watercolour.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

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A. Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Employ a variety of basic techniques for drawing the figure.
- 2. Record visual information from the environment for future reference.
- 3. Work with a variety of drawing media.

B. Learning Outcomes and Elements of the Performance:

Upon successful completion of this course the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. employ a variety of basic techniques for drawing the figure.

Potential elements of the performance:

-demonstrate figure drawing skills through the following exercises: gesture, contour, negative space, continuous line, tone, brush and wash.

2. -record visual information from the environment for future reference;

Potential elements of the performance:

-complete a sketch journal: compile drawings of both specified and optional (personal choice) subject matter for future reference;

-use sketchbook material as reference to complete finished drawings with environmental subject matter.

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3. -work with a variety of drawing media;

Potential elements of the performance:

-complete a variety of drawing exercises using the following media: various graphite media, charcoal, conte, carbon, ink with brush and pen, watercolour, variety of suitable papers.

III. TOPICS

With reference to the figure:

- 1. gesture
- 2. contour
- 3. negative space
- 4. volume
- 5. tone

With reference to the environment:

- 1. perspective
- 2. scale relative to human form
- 3. illustration techniques: visual shorthand vs. rendering
- 4. texture

IV. REQUIRED RESOURCES/TEXT/MATERIALS:

Supplies required for first class:

- 2 sheets Bristol board, any colour
- duct tape
- newsprint pad or loose sheets 18"x 24"
- 2 bulldog clips
- conte stick: red, or brown, or black
- sketchbook, minimum 8.5"x 11"; 11"x 14" preferred

Additional supplies needed later in course:

- graphite sticks
- charcoal sticks

Do not purchase additional supplies until they have been discussed in class.

- nupastel stickcarbon pencils
- kneaded eraser
- fine sandpaper
- · watercolour and brush

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V. EVALUATION PROCESS/GRADING SYSTEM:

Learning Activities

Students will draw from a live model, during three-hour studio classes. Since there is no other way to make up this activity, a **minimum of 80% attendance** (13 complete classes) is mandatory.

Students are required to complete weekly in-class assignments, and to hand in specified drawings for assessment at mid-term and end of term.

Students are required to keep a sketch journal. Some subject matter for study is specified; other subjects are chosen by the individual student.

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Students are required to complete three finished drawing assignments based on the environmental material collected in the sketch journal. The sketch journal material will be presented by the student, in class, to support the completed drawing, on the day the finished drawing is due.

Assignments

Assignments will be evaluated by critique and letter grade, A, B, C, or I (incomplete), and their value weighted according to the following:

1.	In-class figure drawing exercises
2.	Environmental drawings:
