I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An exploration of stone-age cave paintings, megalithic structures, sculpture, architecture and paintings from the Babylonian, Egyptian Mycenean, Minoan, Etruscan, Greek, Roman, Byzantine and Gothic periods.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES:

When you have earned credit for this course, you will have reliably demonstrated ability to:

1. Recognize major artworks through class presentations and research.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- identify major art trends
- recognize major artists and artwork
- make logical inferences and draw conclusions
- determine cause and effect in history
- determine the artist's audience and purpose
- create charts or flip cards to aid in recall
- 2. Understand and describe various techniques used by artists.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- understand and define terms like fresco, secco, waste-mould casting, oil pigment, egg tempera, asymmetric balance, and various elements of design
- describe the advantages and disadvantages of these techniques in specific situations
- Research and document information.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- locate information from various sources including books, periodicals, newspapers, video, CD ROM.
- evaluate material for its relevance
- summarize material
- document in accepted format (APA, MLA)

- 4. Create essays that synthesise the knowledge acquired.
 - Potential Elements of the Performance
 - do primary research in the Art Gallery of Algoma (when applicable)
 - do secondary research beginning with the textbook and proceeding to other sources
 - develop thesis

 - choose an essay format to present the thesis (classification, compare and contrast definition, process)
 - incorporate quotations or paraphrases into the body of the essay
 - write a unified essay that develops to a logical conclusion

Cave paintings at Lascaux, France; Stonehenge; Eqyptian temples and tombs; Mycenae; Knossos; Etruscan Italy; Greece; Rome; Byzantium; Gothic Europe.
