Course Description:	This course is designed to introduce the basics of the Spanish language with emphasis on understanding and speaking the language and mastering some of its basic structures. Spanish and Latin American cultural aspects are also stressed. The four communicative abilities are practiced in the course: listening, reading, speaking, and writing. No previous knowledge of Spanish is required. The course follows a communicative approach and authentic material such as commercials, brochures, and newspapers are used as part of the curriculum.
