Course Description:	<p>The planning and implementation of recreational events is a key skill for Adventure Recreation and Parks students. Events are the fabric of communities, bringing people together for a variety of reasons including fun, fitness, education and competition. Events can also have an enormous financial impact by creating jobs, driving tourism and building sustainable infrastructure that can be used by future generations. This course will take students through the process of recreation event planning to prepare them for the opportunities that exist.</p> <p>Students will examine a number of case studies to grasp the scope and impact of recreational events. The practical component includes hosting a number of community based events where students are involved in all aspects of goal setting, planning, organizing and operating. Careful consideration will be given to community participation, volunteerism, logistics, media relations, finances, promotion, evaluation and risk management.</p>
