Course Description:	In this course, you will be introduced to manual transaxles and front wheel drive axle assemblies. You will observe the disassembly and reassembly of a manual transaxle and CV shaft service. Automatic transmissions will be introduced focusing on pump types, valves, torque converters, driving and holding devices and planetary gear sets both simple and compound. You will participate in the disassembly and tracing of power flows through an automatic transmission and perform pressure tests. You will also be introduced to four wheel drive and all wheel drive systems focusing on construction and operation.				
	Students will be required to follow proper safety procedures when performing the above tasks according to both Sault College Motive Power Department Standards and Vehicle Manufacturers safety regulations and specifications.
