

The student will utilize critical thinking skills required to determine a client's needs in order to appropriately implement components of a treatment plan as prescribed by and under the supervision of a registered Occupational Therapist and/or Physiotherapist. The importance of interdisciplinary collaboration to ensure quality care will be emphasized.
