<b>Course Description:</b>	<p>This course completes flight training toward the Integrated Commercial Pilot License with a group 1 Instrument Rating ICPL(IR).</p> <p>This course involves the multi-engine instrument simulator and flight training for the issuance of a Group 1 Instrument rating.
