Students will prepare a skills-based resume and an effective cover letter to be prepared well in advance for employment possibilities. Job search techniques will also be discussed in preparation for a co-op position. Students will develop a list of places they would be interested in working and start the application process. Opportunities, expectations, and deadlines for co-op are clearly presented, so there is a sound understanding of the path ahead.
