Course Description:	This course will introduce students to the phases of skin treatments including cleanse, skin analysis, exfoliation, extractions, massage, masking and treatment creams. Practical instruction will also focus on performing a full face, neck and decollete massage, a cleansing technique, and incorporating a variety of esthetic equipment. Theoretical understanding of the physiology of the skin, skin types and skin conditions are essential. Students are introduced to the NatureMed Professional product line, as well as, a wide variety of cleansers, tonic lotions, exfoliants, masks and treatment creams. Client consultation and record keeping is emphasized.
