Course Description:	This course will expand on previous studies of natural resources and environmental law and previous activities from fall field camp. Students will further develop field skills and learn techniques to conduct inspections, enforcement actions and investigations including advanced evidence collection techniques. Students will participate in firearms safety training and use of force training relevant to peace officer policy and procedures. Activities will include information sessions and interaction with local enforcement agency representatives and can present excellent networking opportunities for students.
