Course Description:	This course will introduce students to the federal statute known as the Criminal Code of Canada as well as Martins Annual Criminal Code. Students will also be introduced to the most common Criminal Code offences. Offences against the person, property, weapons, and public order offences will be examined. Students will apply knowledge acquired in Criminal and Civil Law to be able to determine the facts in issue for the offences discussed. Criminal procedures regarding the Criminal Court system and students will also research case law related to offences and determine its impact on law enforcement.
