COURSE OUTLINE

This course will provide an overview of the family as a system. Interactions between its members will be explored. These interactions will also include the physical and social environment to which the family is linked. The individual family member will be analyzed as a unit and the family as the larger environment with which he or she transacts. Like any system, the family needs to be flexible enough, yet have firm boundaries, to survive the challenges of many social problems and to offer constancy, support and identity.

The course's primary objective is to study the family system within the sociological perspective. The exploration of sociological problems of the contemporary family such as mobility, divorce, economy, poverty, marital adjustments, unemployment and changing roles will be studies.

COURSE CONTENT

OBJECTIVES:

At the end of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the structure and function of the family.
- Identify the changes in family forms taking place in our society and the needs and problems that arise from these changes.
- Identify the sociological factors that influence the modern family and the needs and problems that arise.
- 4. Describe the family using Systems Theory.
- Discuss the issues facing the child care worker in responding to the needs and problems of families.

EXPECTATIONS:

The course requirements for Family Dynamics I include:

- Read texts and other material as required.
 - Regular class attendance and participation (80% attendance is compulsory to pass the course).

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- Lead one class seminar. Topics are attached to this outline (Dates of presentation will be sorted out during class).
- Complete one midterm paper (2,000 to 2,500 words) on a subject related to the course content and approved by the Instructor.

Students are encouraged to consult: Turabian, Kate L.; A Manual for Writers and Term Papers, Theses and Dissertations, Chicago University of Chicago Press, 1955. as a guide to suitable style in the presentation of formal papers.

An outline will be provided at a later date describing the expectations of this assignment. This report will be handwritten to be completed during and submitted at the end of class.
