PREREQUISITE

Child Care Practice I

PHILOSOPHY AND GOALS OF COURSE

This course is designed to further the skill of the student Child and Youth Worker in handling and treating young people with emotional or behavioural difficulties. Keeping in mind the process of normal child development, efforts will be made to understand the psychodynamics of youths with special needs. There will be an overall emphasis on development of the student's self-awareness and his/her role as part of the therapeutic relationship.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of the source the student will be able to:

- 1. demonstrate an increased self-awareness, especially as it relates to one's own behaviour as a factor in the treatment process.
- to demonstrate an ability to recognize behaviours and to interpret them in terms of setting and establishing treatment goals.
- 3. to demonstrate and understand specific skills required in managing and treating children in care - with some examination of the effects of early separation, neglect, and/or abuse.
- 4. To examine and clarify the role of the C.Y.W. student in a group home/residential setting.

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METHODOLOGY

Lectures, student presentations, films, tapes, and group discussions will be used.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

 Each student or group of students will be responsible to lead a class discussion on an assigned weekly chapter. Students will be required to submit, writing 5 questions to the instructor on the date assigned.

Students should be prepared to lead their classmates in a discussion for 20-30 minutes.

The schedule will be drawn up in class.

2. A formal essay is required by the first class in December 1992. The length should be eight (8) to ten (10) typewritten pages. the topic will be a discussion of the statement: "Troubled youths, perception and feeling are often manifest in behaviour patterns which create circular effects." (Krueger, Page 5) These circular effects manifest themselves in behaviour which impacts on the three broad developmental areas of an adolescent's life; i.e., the emotional, the cognitive, or the physical In general, adolescents may turn in on domains. themselves and develop behavioural problems which are detrimental to themselves or they may act out their difficulties and present with problems which may become detrimental to others. Choose either category of difficulties, with specific reference to the effect this problem has on the physical, emotional, and cognitive development of the adolescent.

This paper should focus on intervention and management issues. The Role of the CYW should also be included.

Five reference books other than course texts are required. Newspaper and magazine articles may also be included.

N.B. Include at least 1 professional journal or periodical in your bibliography.

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A suggested format could look like this:

- Introduction
- effects of topic area on physical development
- effects of topic area on cognitive development
- effects of topic area on emotional development
- Causes
- Treatment including role of CYW (be specific here)
- Conclusion
- References
- APA Format should be used
- 3. There will be two tests one at mid-term and one final.

 Dates to be announced in class.
