NATURE OF COURSE:

This course will attempt to explore various dimensions of moral philosophy pertaining to the nature of value judgements. A basic contention is that our behaviour within interpersonal relationships to a large extent is governed by our particular value system.

Such value systems may change but usually this is only due to the passage of time or a significant emotional event. As Child Care Workers are involved heavily in interpersonal relationships and with behaviour, it is important to understand our own value systems and how they effect our behaviour. Such study would lead to an understanding of how to determine a young person's value system, and help this person come to an understanding of such processes. The other basic contention is that the universe is not composed of absolute parts but in reality is an ever changing ever evolving process, where component parts most realistically may be defined only in relation (ie. relative) to each other. We will study particular cases to enable us to understand these concepts.

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES:

- To come to an understanding of basic concepts in the study of value judgements and relativity.
- To identify various value systems which help determine one's own behaviour and to study such processes.
- To relate such understanding to our involvement with other people especially to young people and to those with special needs.
- 4. To examine the nature of decision-making process, the necessity to weighing alternatives, but still making decisions about how we are to get in various situations. To connect this with the notion of personal responsibility and justification of our decisions (ie. accountability).
- 5. An examination of the expanding role of CCW as child advocate.

- Book Report: The requirement is a standard book report with the focus on ethical issues in the book - length 1200-1500 words - Due date March 26, 1985.
- Test Final day of class. This test will be aimed at revealing your ability to apply the concepts studied in the course.
- Final Paper Due second last day of class. 1200-1500 words. Paper should be a statement of personal philosophy regarding children in care, child rearing etc.
