COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will provide a practical orientation to the legislation regarding young persons in conflict with the law, i.e. The Young Offenders Act. This course will examine the impact of the legislation on young offenders, and on the service delivery system responsible for its implementation, i.e. the justice system. The orientation, programs, and procedures utilized by the various youth justice agencies will be discussed. As well, this course will explore the various programs and treatment methods used by the justice system and by justice related agencies to prevent juvenile crime.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- explain and interpret the pertinent statutory provisions of the Young Offenders Act.
- discuss in some detail the philosophy, the procedures, and the practical problems relating to the administration of youth justice under the Young Offenders Act.
- identify the components and the functions of the justice delivery system including the police, courts, corrections, and residential services.
- describe and discuss a variety of delinquency prevention programs used by justice agencies to prevent, control, and treat young offenders.

LEARNING RESOURCES:

In addition, pertinent handouts will be provided by the instructor as source and reading material for the student.

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METHODOLOGY:

Classes will be conducted in a variety of ways with student participation an integral part of the learning process. Classes will consist of lectures, case presentations, guest speakers, discussions, and small group work.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

All assignment must be turned in on time. Emergencies or serious illness are considered the only valid excuse for late assignments.

- There will be two (2) tests on the material from the text, class lecture and discussion, and in-class audiovisual sources. The mid-term will be worth 25% of the total grade and the final will be worth 30%. Date of tests: T.B.A.
