COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will cover a number of topics in the area of psychopathology, including classification systems, behaviour disorders, psychoses, neuroses. Students will have the opportunity to gain a general understanding of these topics. In all cases, psychopathologies will be viewed from a variety of perspectives and in light of "normal" development patterns. The case study approach will enable students to practically apply the knowledge they gain. Psychopathologies will continue to be viewed from the perspective of normal development and as occurring within a systems context.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

By the end of the course, the student:

- will have reviewed and reintegrated knowledge of normal development patterns from physical, psychological, social, and cognitive perspectives;
- will have examined signs and symptoms of a variety of psychopathologies pertaining to childhood and adolescence;
- will have developed skill in case analysis working within a team framework;
- 4. will be familiar with basic terminology in this area of study;
- will have an increased ability to accept and work with others despite their handicaps, disabilities, and mental or behavioural dysfunction.

REQUIREMENT FOR COURSE COMPLETION:

Individual students will be assigned specific chapters of the text. Arrangements of times will be announced in class. The individual will answer questions from the class, on these readings. Then the student will administer, to the class, a short quiz on the assigned readings. The quiz should be True/False, Multiple Choice, Short answer only and take no more than 10 minutes to complete. Students will be graded on the quality of the summary presentation, their ability to answer questions and on the quality of the quiz they prepare.

From the assignment above, the marks which students obtain on the quizzes will count as percentage of the final grade.

CASE ANALYSIS:

Student groups will be required to orally present their findings and conclusions to the class. These groups will be considered as a clinical team for the duration of the semester and will be graded for their thoroughness and professionalism. During this semester, emphasis will be on treatment issues. Students will be expected to develop and explain treatment rationale as it pertains to the case and the pathology presented.

TESTS:

There will be two tests: one mid-term and one final. Mid-term is February 28, 1991. Final test is April 25, 1991.

PARTICIPATION

Includes attendance, punctuality, involvement, contribution and professional attitude. Self-evaluation will be expected as part of this grade. Regarding attendance, 5% of the overall final grade will be deducted for every class missed over three classes.
