PREREQUISITE(S): GROUP DYNAMICS I

#### I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

The focus will be on child and adolescent group behaviour, especially in residential treatment. An emphasis will be placed on the student's role as a facilitator in group in this respect.

- To continue the process of learning how our own values, attitudes, and behaviours affect others.
