PREREQUISITE(S): GROUP DYNAMICS I - HSC 202-3

I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course is designed to build on the skills developed in Group Dynamics I. Opportunities will be provided for the individual student to utilize skills in group process. The focus will be on child and adolescent group behaviour, especially groups in treatment. An emphasis will be placed on the student's role as a facilitator in group in this respect.

II. STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

- demonstrate skills that provide leadership and direction to group.
- 2) discuss the dynamics of group growth and decision-making
- demonstrate group exercises appropriate for specific client populations (primarily children and adolescents in treatment).
- 4) propose a plan for the development of group management/intervention strategies.
- 5) articulate how values, attitudes, and behaviours affect others in the therapeutic process.
- 6) participate in the development/maintenance of a "team" approach as an intervention strategy.

III. TOPICS TO BE COVERED

In that this course builds on material from Group Dynamics I, the topics are consistent and include:

- Leadership
- 2. Problem Solving
- Decision Making
- Power and Influence
- Controversy and Creativity
- Team Work
- Developing

IV. LEARNING ACTIVITIES

Much of the learning that occurs will be in the experiential format.

Presentation format will vary depending upon issues being covered. Active participation in the group experience is essential.

Stage of Group Development:

Identify factors critical to the success of the activity relative to group readiness.

Synopsis:

A brief but comprehensive description of the activity.

Materials:

A detailed list (including diagrams), where applicable, of all necessary equipment, space requirements, etc.

Method/Procedure:

Describe in detail how the activity is to be conducted.

Discussion:

List suggestion for discussion post exercise.

Variations:

Suggest possible variations for the exercise.

Reference:

State sources of materials used.

Evaluation:

Student is required to do a written self-evaluation following the presentation of the exercise. This is due the week after the presentation.

Dates will be assigned. If it becomes necessary for a student to change a presentation date, he/she is responsible for notifying the instructor in writing and signed by both parties involved in the change.

Student will write a short research paper (1200 - 2000) words) on one of the following topics - or a topic mutually agreed upon after discussion with the instructor.
