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PHILOSOPHY/GOALS (COURSE DESCRIPTION)

This course introduces students to some interesting themes and characters from Canadian literature and history. They will meet saints and explorers, soldiers and journalists, poets and novelists of international stature as they examine the national experience.

We will sample representative writing from various times and places, the themes providing a sense of coherence.

Students will be assigned readings in preparation for lectures. Some of these will be "handouts", but the majority will be taken from The Oxford Anthology of Canadian Literature.


The students may be assigned a short essay commenting on readings or in-class films. They may also be required to answer an essay-type question or a series of short questions on the content of the material covered.

Quizzes are designed to stimulate a close and thoughtful reading of assigned material and to ensure regular attendance at classes. Therefore any quiz missed will be graded "zero" except where the student can supply documented proof of illness or other extreme hardship.
