I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course will provide the student with the opportunity to explore the concept of caring as a core value that is basic to the practice of nursing. Insight into personal interactive style will occur through reflection and journal writing. Interpersonal skills will be developed and will be practiced as they pertain to the helping relationship. Group dynamics will be examined and opportunities to practice as an effective group member will be provided.

II, LEARNING OUTCOMES:

In this course, many learning activities are designed to foster collaborate learning in small groups. In order for the learner to develop the ability to critically think, reflect and integrate new information, the learner must engage in active dialogue with colleagues and the teacher. It is therefore to the learner's benefit that the learner attend and participate in class.

Upon completion of this course, the student will have:

- 1. examined the concept of caring as the foundation of the interactive process that takes place between students and teachers, students and peers and nurses and clients.
- 2. initiated caring behaviours for self and others.
- 3. evaluated personal interactive style in relationships,
- 4. demonstrated the interpersonal skills which promote and maintain a helping relationship with people from diverse backgrounds.
- 5. applied group process and evaluated self as a group member

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III. TOPICS TO BE COVERED;

The following concepts will be examined:

- Caring
- Journal writing
- Personal Self: self-discovery of interaction style
- Helping relationship
- Interpersonal skills: Assertiveness

- Group process
