Course Description:	In this course, students will apply fundamental concepts and skills from CHM190 to further examine chemical reactions and systems. Topics include energy changes in chemical and physical processes, nuclear chemistry, reaction rate, equilibrium systems, acids and bases, and organic chemistry. This course approaches chemistry from a health perspective and will highlight the connections of chemistry to the human body and medicine. Laboratory work in this course will focus on applying the scientific method to investigations in chemistry, the human body, and health. The purpose of the lab work is to develop investigative and research skills while gaining a better understanding of the theoretical concepts.

Analyze chemical equilibrium systems and solve qualitative and quantitative problems.	4.1 Use appropriate terminology to describe equilibrium systems. 4.2 Explain the concept of dynamic equilibrium in physical and chemical systems. 4.3 Analyze chemical systems in the human body that involve a chemical equilibrium (ex. blood buffer systems). 4.4 Apply Le Chatelier's principle to predict the effect of a variety of stresses (adding/removing a substance, changing pressure, changing temperature) on a system at equilibrium. 4.5 Write expressions for common equilibrium constants (K_{eq} , K_{sp} , K_a , K_b , K_w). 4.6 Solve problems involving concentrations and equilibrium constants.

Analyze acid-base reactions and solve problems involving pH.	5.1 Describe and compare the characteristics of acids and bases. 5.2 Identify strong acids, strong bases, weak acids, weak bases, and conjugate acid-base pairs. 5.3 Describe neutralization reactions using balanced chemical equations. 5.4 Investigate and solve quantitative problems involving neutralization reactions. 5.5 Define pH and explain how pH relates to hydronium concentration. 5.6 Calculate the hydronium concentration, hydroxide concentration, pH, and pOH of a solution. 5.7 Compare the relative strength of weak acids and weak bases based on their equilibrium constants. 5.8 Analyze acid-base equilibria and solve quantitative problems involving concentration, pH, pOH, K_a , K_b , and K_w . 5.9 Predict whether an aqueous solution of a given salt will be acidic, basic, or neutral. 5.10 Describe how buffers stabilize the pH of a solution and calculate the pH of buffer systems.

		6.6 Classify alcohols and amines as primary, secondary or tertiary. 6.7 Identify the functional groups and components of a variety of biomolecules such as carbohydrates, phospholipids, amino acids, nucleotides, ATP, cholesterol, and triglycerides. 6.8 Recognize amino acids based on their functional groups.

Analyze the properties and reactions of organic compounds and explain their biological, medical, or environmental significance.	7.1 Explain isomerism in organic compounds and how different isomers can have dramatically different properties. 7.2 Relate some common uses of hydrocarbons (such as solvents and fuels) to their physical and chemical characteristics. 7.3 Relate the length of the carbon chain of a carboxylic acid to its solubility in water. 7.4 Relate important physical and chemical properties of alcohols to their structure (such as their solubility in water and the ability to dissolve non-polar compounds in liquid drug formulations). 7.5 Relate some structural characteristics of biomolecules to their function in organisms (such as the hydrophilic and hydrophobic parts of phosphoglycerides). 7.6 Compare the physical properties and chemical behaviour of families of organic compounds. 7.7 Use structural equations to predict the products of hydration, dehydration, condensation, hydrolysis, and redox reactions involving organic and biological compounds. 7.8 Describe the formation of polymers (such as polypeptides) from monomers such as amino acids, glucose, or ethene and recognize these polymers in substances in our everyday lives (proteins, starch, polyethylene). 7.9 Define oxidation and reduction in organic reactions and explain the roles of oxygen and hydrogen in biochemical redox reactions. 7.10 Identify the oxidizing and reducing agents in biochemical redox reactions. 7.11 Identify oxidation and reduction reactions in metabolic pathways and describe the concept of metabolism based on the oxidation sequence of alcohol to aldehyde to carboxylic acid to carbon dioxide.
