

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course provides a forum for learners to reflect on and analyze the conceptual understandings of the content of current and past nursing courses. By sharing with peers, learning about self and others will be enhanced.

The focus of NURS 4057 is to promote professional growth of the student as a self-directed and independent learner. The student will demonstrate critical appraisal of the nursing and health care literature and critical thinking skills in the examination of professional and practice issues.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:**Ends-in-View**

During this semester, the learner will explore ways nurses can influence and create their futures as professionals within the health care system. Emphasis is on growth of the learner as a professional nurse who is critically reflective. The learner's responsibility to ongoing professional growth and development will be explored through examination of self and professional and practice issues.

Process

The course will be delivered in an internet (web-based) learning environment.

Except for an initial orientation session, there are no on-campus weekly classes. Instead, course requirements will be fulfilled by using WebCT available through the Sault College website

All students are expected to be active participants in the course. Your active participation will be demonstrated by regular use of the WebCT communication tools, posting of assignments and commentaries on the bulletin board, and the completion and submission of all assignments. Emphasis is on demonstration of critical thinking about nursing practice and professional issues.

* In addition, it is expected that students in preparing assignments will make use of textbooks previously required for other nursing courses, as well as, library and internet resources to seek out relevant articles in the nursing and health care literature.

V. EVALUATION PROCESS/GRADING SYSTEM:

A passing grade of 60% is required in all nursing courses. The grade for NURS 4057 will be based on the following methods of evaluation.

1. Demonstrated active participation in the on-line learning environment

 - Ongoing posting of commentaries on the course bulletin board10%
2. Completion of a Professional Profile
Due date is Friday, February 18 at 1600 hrs 45%
3. Completion of two (2) professional issue essays
 - Persuasive essay and Abstract
Due date is a Friday, March 18 at 1600 hrs 20%
 - Editorial
Due date is Friday, April 8 at 1600 hrs 20%

A hard copy is required for the following assignments:

- Professional profile
- Persuasive essay
- Editorial

A second copy of these assignments must be submitted in the Assignment drop-box on WebCT for NURS 4057.

Students who are unable to submit hard copies in person may mail assignments through Canada Post (post-marked on or before the due date) or send them using a courier service.

V. EVALUATION PROCESS/GRADING SYSTEM:

GUIDELINES FOR WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS

- The School of Nursing guidelines regarding the marking of assignments will be followed for each assignment. See the Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing Student Manual 2004-2005.
- All assignments must comply with APA style format. Students may lose up to 10% of the total possible mark of an assignment for poor form and writing style. ***It is expected that students who have experienced difficulties with writing competency in past courses will seek help from the Writing Assistance Program or other resources prior to submission of their assignment.***
- **PAY CLOSE ATTENTION TO ALL ASSIGNMENT DUE DATES.** Extensions for assignments ***will not*** be granted. A penalty of 10% per day will be deducted to any assignment handed in after the due date of the assignment.

NOTE:

For such reasons as program certification or program articulation, certain courses require minimums of greater than 50% and/or have mandatory components to achieve a passing grade.

It is also important to note, that the minimum overall GPA required in order to graduate from a Sault College program remains 2.0.

All NURS courses require 60% for a passing grade.

All science courses, including BIOL2105, BIOL2111, CHMI2220 and elective courses require 50% for a passing grade.

VI. SPECIAL NOTES:Special Needs:

If you are a student with special needs (e.g. physical limitations, visual impairments, hearing impairments, or learning disabilities), you are encouraged to discuss required accommodations with your professor and/or the Special Needs office.
