# COURSE PHILOSOPHY/GOALS

This course is designed to inform the student of the primary, legal responsibility of ensuring security in a correctional facility, and to provide the student with an understanding of an ability to apply the security techniques available.

- 6. demonstrate an ability to preserve evidence and provide reasons based on law for the preservation.

- demonstrate the use of the various types of instructions/orders given to offenders.
- 10. describe, differentiate, and demonstrate the levels of control used to manage offenders.

- 3. Security techniques of area/person search, key control, contraband, counts, security checks, escorting, handcuffing/leg irons, and admission/discharge.

- 7. Preservation of evidence.
