COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will build on the foundation of legal principles and knowledge obtained in Law I. The student will gain an understanding of how the statutes are applied in the administration of justice.

OBJECTIVES:

The student will be able to:

1. Outline and discuss the history and development of provincial laws, government regulations, and orders-in-council.
2. Explain and discuss the use of selected federal and provincial statutes and municipal by-laws.
3. Discuss selected government regulations and their application to law enforcement.
4. Discuss and comment on Human Rights legislation.
5. Discuss the relevance of selected federal and provincial cases.
