I. COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course leads students through an in-depth review of federal acts and regulations pertaining to natural resources and parks. Students will learn how to locate, interpret and analyze various federal acts, regulations and cases.

- Interpretation and application of the Canada Wildlife Act
- Interpretation and application of the Environmental Violations
   Administrative Monetary Penalties Act related to the Wild Animal and
   Plant Protection and Regulation of the International and
   Interprovincial Trade Act and the Canada Wildlife Act

This learning outcome will constitute approximately 20 % of the course's grade

3. Interpret federal legislation pertaining to parks, specifically the Canada National Parks Act

- Interpretation and application of the Canada National Parks Act and the regulations
- Interpretation and application of the Environmental Violations Administrative Monetary Penalties Act related to the Canada National Parks Act

This learning outcome will constitute approximately 15 % of the course.

Interpret federal legislation pertaining to endangered species and migratory birds, specifically the Species at Risk Act, the Migratory Birds Convention Act and the Environmental Violation Administration Monetary Penalties Act as it relates to the MBCA, WAPPRIITA, CWA and CNPA.

- Interpretation and application of the Species at Risk Act
- Interpretation and application of the Migratory Birds Convention Act and the regulations
- Interpretation and application of the Environmental Violations Administrative Monetary Penalties Act related to the MBCA

This learning outcome will constitute approximately 20 % of the course's grade

5. Interpret federal legislation pertaining to boating, specifically the Canada Shipping Act and the Small Vessel Regulations
