Course Description:	In this course, a sociological perspective will be used to examine a variety of aspects of health, illness, and health care in Canada. During the course, students will critically explore the social causes and consequences of illness, and will use the concept of social construction to explain an individuals experience of health and health care. Critical exploration will include examination of the distribution of health problems in Canada, Canadian health care policy and practice, and the roles played by technology, the economy and health care professionals. Emphasis will be placed on exploring how social influences like inequality, gender, class, ethnicity, and political economy affect health.
